LAE RECOGNIZES LOUISIANA'S NATIONAL BOARD CERTIFIED TEACHERS AS LEADERS IN EDUCATION

ASSOCIATION HOSTS EVENT TO HONOR EDUCATORS AND LAUNCH NEW NBCT NETWORK



Resolution offered by State Representative John Bel Edwards proclaiming October 8, 2015 as Louisiana National Board Certified Teacher Day. National Board Certified Teachers from across Louisiana gathered in Lafayette earlier this month to be a part of the official launch of a new statewide network for NBCTs for which the LAE will be the sponsoring organization. The evening also focused on the power that NBCTs have to transform the perception of school teachers and education support professionals.

"The praise of Louisiana's certified teachers is long overdue," said LAE President Debbie Meaux. "Educators are the experts in their respective fields. They understand their craft and know what their students need. It's time they were recognized for their

dedication to their profession and treated with the respect they deserve."

National Board of Professional Teaching Standards Director of Outreach and Engagement Michaela Miller presented an overview of critical changes in the National Board program. Then, it was on to the official network launch, led by NBCT Montgomery County

Institute Program Coordinator Ellen Holmes.

President Meaux recognized those in attendance as leaders in education. She said she hopes the event helps to connect and unite those with a proven commitment to the profession.

"National Board Certified Teachers demonstrate the value of professionalism in education and, together, can be strong advocates for changing the tide, not just for our profession, but for our educational system as a whole," Meaux said.

State Representative John Bel Edwards offered a resolution proclaiming October 8, 2015, as Louisiana National Board Certified Teacher Day. The resolution urged all citizens to recognize NBCTs for the care and commitment they've shown to Louisiana's school children.

STRONG SUPPORTER OF PUBLIC EDUCATION

John Bel Edwards is the husband of a teacher. He has a proven track record of standing up for Louisiana public schools, educators, and children on issue after issue.

- In 2011, John Bel Edwards fought to improve the process for auditing schools in academic crisis.
- In 2012, when Governor Jindal and his allies attacked public education with ill-conceived, unconstitutional schemes, John Bel Edwards was one of the only legislators who did his homework. He read the legislation, pointed out several glaring flaws, and stood strong in defense of the Louisiana Constitution. John Bel Edwards was a staunch advocate for Louisiana teachers, school employees, and parents who were locked out of the Louisiana State Capitol during the debate.
- In 2013, John Bel Edwards led the charge to increase Louisiana public school funding (the first in five years), with 50 percent of the increase going toward educator pay raises.
- This year, John Bel Edwards ensured that an additional \$36 million was added to the budget to preserve teacher pay raises after the legislature rejected the Minimum Foundation Program formula.



DEDICATED PUBLIC SERVANT

John Bel learned the importance of public service at an early age. As one of eight children from a family long dedicated to public service, John Bel Edwards carries on the family tradition currently serving as the Louisiana State Representative for District 72.



RESPECTED VETERAN

John Bel Edwards graduated from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point. He served eight years on active duty as an Airborne Ranger and commanded a rifle company in the 82nd Airborne Division.

SMALL BUSINESS MAN

A graduate of LSU Law School, John Bel Edwards runs a law firm in his hometown of Amite.

FAMILY MAN

John Bel Edwards' strong family ties have shaped both his commitments to his own community as well as his family. John Bel's mother taught him both the compassion he demonstrates as a legislator and his belief in the power of prayer. HERE ARE SOME IMPORTANT THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE BESE

The Louisiana Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE) is the administrative body for all Louisiana public elementary and secondary schools. One of the body's most significant roles is administering the yearly budget for Louisiana's public schools through the Minimum Foundation Program (MFP). The BESE also adopts regulations and enacts policies governing the operations of the schools under its jurisdiction and exercises budgetary oversight of their educational programs and services.

The board is composed of 11 members. Eight are elected, one representative from each of the state's eight BESE districts. Three members are appointed by the governor to represent the state at-large; these members must be confirmed by the Louisiana Senate. The ideal candidate for each seat should have values that are in line with the following key traits of a pro-public education supporter. The ideal BESE representative should...

- Have a trusted track record of advocating for adequate investments in student learning, so that all Louisiana students —regardless of their zip code—receive the educational tools they need to learn.
- Recognize the importance of collaborative partnerships with key public education stakeholders students, parents, public school employees, and community members to address concerns and work on positive solutions for improving Louisiana's public schools.
- Commit to ensuring that every Louisiana student has a caring, qualified, and committed teacher in their classroom by providing educators with the resources, mentoring, and professional support they need to supply students with the best 21stcentury educational experiences.
